FIVE HEADS ... with but a single thought (MARK 10: 21; JOHN 9: 25; LUKE 10: 42; PSALM 27: 4; PHILIPPIANS 3: 13)

It is far better to have one aim in life, and to achieve an ambition, than to attempt inumerable things and miss them all! Centrality of purpose is always a commendable feature, and it is truly significant that five of the leading Bible characters excelled in this respect. When these are grouped together we are provided with a sequence of thought which embraces the entire range of Christian experience.

One Thing Thou Lackest "

When the Lord Jesus told the rich young ruler to keep tile Commandments, the earnest seeker replied, "Master, all these have I observed from my youth. Then Jesus beholding him loved him, and said unto him, One thing thou lackest: go thy way, sell whatsoever thou hast, and give to the poor, and thou shalt have treasure in heaven: and come, take tip the cross, and follow me. And he was sad at that saying, and went away grieved; for he had great possessions." This illustrious young man possessed everything except that which mattered most. His home was filled with valuables, while his soul remained poor. Life begins when man responds to the call of Christ to take up the cross and follow in the path of discipleship. No amount of money, no degree of popularity, no worldly honors can ever compensate for the loss of eternal treasure.

## One Thing I Know

The street was filled with people; the religious leaders were protesting against the enthusiasm aroused by the latest miracle of Jesus. The people were fools swayed by every, wind of doctrine! This was a storm in a teacup! "Then again called they the man that was blind, and said unto him, Give God the praise: we know that this man is a sinner. He answered and said, Whether he be a sinner or no, I know not: one thing I know, that, whereas I was blind, now I see." In contrast to the rich young ruler, this man was willing to sacrifice anything in order to follow Christ; and his unashamed testimony surely brought joy to the Saviour's heart. Military leaders say that attack is often the best defense. This is true of spiritual warfare.

The charming home in Bethany had suddenly become a place of strain. The atmosphere was tense, and there seemed every likelihood of a first-class quarrel. When twenty people were waiting for their meal, and many tasks demanded attention in the kitchen, "Mary sat at Jesus' feet, and heard his word." Martha's patience suddenly failed, and looking into the Lord's face, she said, "Dost thou not care that my sister hath left me to serve alone? bid her therefore that she help me. And Jesus answered . . . thou art careful and troubled about many things: But one thing is needful: and Mary hath chosen that good part, which shall not be taken away from her." Spiritual appetite is always an indication of a healthy soul. In any case, Mary would have been useless in the kitchen, when her heart was in the parlour!

Paul never permitted interference with the realization of his greatest ambitions, and ultimately he was able to say, " I have finished my course . . . henceforth there is laid up for me a crown."
